Whereas, The Bonds financed (a) a certain project (the "Project") consisting of: (i) the acquisition by the Agency of a leasehold interest to approximately 16 acres of real property located at 4515 Euphrates River Valley Road, Fort Drum, New York 13602 (the "Land") along with the existing improvements located upon the Land, principally consisting of a 60MW coal-fired power plant building, related equipment and electrical transmission improvements located upon the Land (the "Existing Improvements"), (ii) the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation and refitting of the Existing Improvements for operation thereof as a bio-mass fed electrical generation facility (collectively, the "Improvements"), and (iii) the acquisition in and around the Existing Improvements and Improvements and of certain items of equipment and other tangible personal property and equipment (the "Equipment" and collectively with the Land, Existing Improvements and the Improvements, the "Facility"), (b) paying certain costs and expenses incidental to the issuance of the Bonds and/or establishment of debt service reserve funds, and (c) the lease (with the obligation to purchase) of the Facility to the Company; and

Whereas, Pursuant to and in accordance with Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and in furtherance of the Project and the original issuance of the Bonds, the Issuer previously scheduled, noticed and conducted a public hearing (the "Original Public Hearing") on the 28th day of June, 2012 at 10:00 a.m. local time, at LeRay Town Hall, 8650 LeRay Street, Evans Mills, New York, whereat representatives of the Agency presented a copy of the Application (as defined in the Notice of the Original Public Hearing) (including a cost-benefit analysis) and heard and accepted written and oral comments from all persons with views in favor of, opposed to or otherwise relevant to the Project and issuance of the Bonds; and

Whereas, This County Board of Legislators approved the original issuance of the Bonds by Resolution No. 231 on October 7, 2014; and

Whereas, The Company has requested that the Issuer approve certain amendments to the terms of the Bonds and the Issuer has so approved such amendments, which require an additional approval pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Code; and

Whereas, Pursuant to and in accordance with Section 147(f) of the Code, and in furtherance of the Project and the proposed Reissuance of the Bonds, the Issuer previously scheduled, noticed and conducted a public hearing (the "Public Hearing") on the 5th day of December, 2019 at 8:30 a.m. local time, at 800 Starbuck Avenue, Watertown, New York 13601, whereat representatives of the Issuer heard and accepted written and oral comments from all persons with views in favor of, opposed to or otherwise relevant to the Project and the Reissuance of the Bonds; and

Whereas, The County Board of Legislators, after due consideration of the foregoing, as the "applicable elected representative" of the County of Jefferson (the "County"), within the meaning of Section 147(f)(2)(E) of the Code, desires to approve the Reissuance of the Bonds, provided the principal, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds shall be special limited obligations of the Issuer and shall never be a debt of the State of New York (the "State") or any political subdivision thereof, including, without limitation, the County, and neither the State, nor any political subdivision thereof, including, without limitation, the County, shall be liable thereon; and

Whereas, The County Board of Legislators, after due consideration of the foregoing, desires to authorize the issuance of Bonds by the Issuer pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Code. Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, By the Board of Legislators of the County of Jefferson as follows:

Section 1. Imploring the State of New York to Immediately Amend or Delay Implementation of

Bail and Discovery Reform Laws That Will Endanger the People of New York

By Legislator: William W. Johnson

Whereas, The Jefferson County Board of Legislators recognizes the need for statewide bail and discovery reform, and

Whereas, Protecting the people from harm by enforcing the rule of law is the fundamental role of government, and

Whereas, No group is more vulnerable than the victims of crime, and a just society demands that crime victims should be recognized as key participants within the criminal justice system and be treated with dignity, fairness, and respect, and

Whereas, In the final stages of adopting its FY 2020 budget, the State of New York enacted sweeping criminal justice reforms including the elimination of cash bail for many specific enumerated crimes and the imposition of stringent discovery mandates on police and prosecutors, and

Whereas, Under bail reform, beginning January 1, 2020, judges will be stripped of their discretion to set bail for many specific enumerated crimes, which means those suspected of committing these crimes can no longer be held in jail after their arrest, regardless of the strength of the case against these defendants, or the length of the potential sentence faced by these defendants, or the extent of the harm allegedly caused by these defendants, and instead these defendants will be released back into the general public, and

Whereas, These crimes include those that result in the deaths of innocent people, including several subcategories of homicide and manslaughter, making a terrorist threat and money laundering in support of terrorism in the third and fourth degree, promoting an obscene sexual performance by a child, possessing an obscene sexual performance by a child, failure to register as a sex offender, patronizing a person for prostitution in a school zone, aggravated assault upon a person less than eleven years old, reckless assault of a child by a daycare provider, criminal sale of a controlled substance to a child, abandonment of a child, criminal possession of a weapon on school grounds, female genital mutilation, stalking in the second degree, aggravated harassment, endangering the welfare of a vulnerable elderly person or an incompetent or physically disabled person, aggravated cruelty to animals, torturing animals and injuring animals, assault in the third degree, aggravated vehicular assault, and other crimes of physical violence against people, burglary of a residence, bail jumping and unlawfully fleeing a police officer in a motor vehicle, and

Whereas, All of the offenders mentioned heretofore are at risk of not showing up for court, thereby placing a burden on public employees who, under this law, are required to send multiple court appearance reminders to these offenders, as well as police officers and District Attorneys who must commit resources to tracking and pursuing those who evade prosecution, and

Whereas, All offenders who are currently being held in custody for non-qualifying crimes including those mentioned heretofore will be eligible for release from custody on January 1, 2020, and

Whereas, The discovery mandates imposed by the State of New York will require police and District Attorneys', beginning January 1, 2020, to turn over voluminous trial related materials to defense attorneys within 15 days, creating a mandate that will inevitably not be achieved in some cases and may result in the inability of the People to properly prosecute cases against criminal defendants, and

Whereas, The office of New York State's chief law enforcement officer, Attorney General Letitia James, testified at a state legislative hearing on October 28, 2019, that there will be implementation difficulties because prosecutors across the state lack the resources required to full comply with discovery mandates, and

Whereas, Discovery reform will also result in an opportunity for defendants to gain access to crime scenes that may include a victim's residence, thereby giving defendants accused of burglaries, assaults, rapes and other crimes committed in victims' homes the right to return to those same homes, and

Whereas, The issues mentioned heretofore will undeniably impact past, present and future victims of crime in a negative manner, and in doing so, the bail and discovery reforms adopted by the State of New York will themselves further victimize these innocent individuals, and

Whereas, These bail and discovery laws, in their current form, represent a clear and present danger to society, will tilt the scales of justice in favor of suspected criminals and away from innocent crime victims, and risk reversing decades of progress made by the State of New York in reducing crime.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Jefferson County Board of Legislators hereby implores the State of New York to immediately amend or otherwise delay implementation of these laws by convening an emergency session of the State Legislature, or by emergency executive authority, or by any other means deemed possible by the State, and to do so before December 31, 2019, and be it further

Resolved, That the following improvements to these laws be implemented as soon as possible:

- 1. Give judges the discretion to impose bail when appropriate for all of the crimes enumerated in this resolution;
- 2. Increase the discovery timeline from 15 days to a minimum of 45 days;
- 3. Phase in discovery reform by applying these new mandates only to misdemeanors effective January 1, 2020, and then to felonies effective January 1, 2021, and repeal the provision that makes the new discovery mandates applicable to violations of the Vehicle and Traffic Law;
- 4. Require that court appearance reminders are sent not only to defendants but also to the victims of their crimes; and

5. Extend appropriate dignity, fairness and respect to crime victims by soliciting input from victim advocate organizations and considering their suggestions for improving these laws, and be it further

Resolved, That the Jefferson County Board of Legislators asks all counties in New York State to urge their state representatives to take immediate action on the foregoing, and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be provided to Governor Andrew Cuomo, Attorney General Letitia James, Senator Patty Ritchie, Assemblyman Ken Blankenbush, Assemblyman Mark Walczyk, Assemblyman Will Barclay and the New York State Association of Counties.

Authorizing Agreement for Provision of Related Services in Connection with the Program for Preschool Children with Disabilities

Authorizing the Jefferson County Medical Examiner's Office to Accept Computers from the NYS DOH

Whereas, Jefferson County Medical Examiner's ability to identify and track opioid related and other violent deaths is a key element in responding to this epidemic and protecting County residents health and well being, and

Whereas, Providing the Medical Examiners with tools such as tablets to use in the field will assist in collecting more accurate data, and

Whereas, Jefferson County has been awarded three (3) tablets and two (2) laptops equipped with software through a New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) program in conjunction with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention at no cost to our county, and

Whereas, The software included in the tablets will ease the burden of required Medical Examiner reports for programs such as the NYS Department of Motor Vehicles Fatal Accident Reporting System and the NYSDOH National Violent Death Reporting System, along with assisting in creating counts of specific types of deaths when requested.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Jefferson County Medical Examiner's Office is hereby authorized to accept these tablets and laptops for Jefferson County in order to assist in this vital work.

Authorizing Agreement for Provision of Certain Professional Services to the Medical Examiner's Office

Whereas, It is desirable to have the extensive resources of the Onondaga County Medical Examiner's (M.E.) Office available for backup to support the operation of the Jefferson County Medical Examiner (M.E.) Program particularly during those times when the Jefferson County M.E. is out of the area on vacation, medical leave or other unexpected absences, and in instances involving complicated deaths, and

Whereas, Per Resolution 222 of 2016 this Board authorized an agreement with Onondaga County, which has now restructured their M.E. services and requested a new agreement.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That Jefferson County enter into an agreement with Onondaga County on an as needed provision of professional autopsy and testing services by the Onondaga County M.E.'s Office for the period January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2022, and be it further

Resolved, The 2020-2022 rates shall be at the current published charges in effect for each year and on file with Jefferson County at the time the service is requested and rendered, and be it further

Resolved, That the Chairman of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to execute said agreement on behalf of Jefferson County subject to the review of the County Attorney as to form and content.

Resolution No. 278

Authorizing Agreement and Establishing Rates for Transportation Service for Preschool Children with Disabilities and Early Intervention Infants and Toddlers with Delays

Whereas, Public Health Law Article 25, Title 2-A requires the County of Jefferson to provide transportation assistance or services to children with disabilities as defined under Public Health Law and Education Law, and

Whereas, A bid was publically issued by Jefferson County Purchasing Department in June of 2019, and the bid awarded to a contractor who subsequently defaulted in performance under the award, on notice of only seven business days, and

Whereas, First Student, Inc., the second lowest bidder, at the time of the original bid, has agreed to accept the contract at their original bid price and commence service without interruption to the existing rider ship, and

Whereas, Under General Municipal Law §103(4), in the event of an occurrence affecting the public's life, health, or safety so as to require immediate action, a municipality may proceed to award a contract in the absence of competitive bidding, and

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Board of Legislators hereby finds that the absence of a transportation provider is unacceptable to the children and families dependent on said transportation to preschool and other services and places the County in violation of the law and therefore finds that a public emergency exists pursuant to General Municipal Law §103(4), and it is further

Resolved, That the Chairman of the Board is authorized and directed to execute an agreement with First Student, Inc. to provide transportation services for the period December 2, 2019 through June 30, 2022 at the rate of \$98.52 per child per day transported, subject to approval of the County Attorney as to form and content.

Seconded by Legislator: Anthony J. Doldo

All members present voted aye.

Legislator Peck advised that the Jefferson Bulk Milk Cooperative has a contract with Kraft Heinz for locally produced milk, and the Cooperative was notified last week that after January 1, 2020 Kraft Heinz will no longer accept their milk as they went with a lower bidder. He said the Cooperative is working very hard to find an alternate source for their milk as it affects a large number of local businesses, and he has been in touch with elected officials to seek their assistance. Chairman Gray said he will be at a meeting later in the week with our State representatives and will make sure to make contact with them about this subject.

Administrator Hagemann noted that copies of the 2020 Adopted Budget and the picture of the Board for this term (2018-2019) were on legislators' desks.

Chairman Gray advised that he will be conducting a webinar on December 18, 2019 along with New York State officials concerning the Lake Ontario/St. Lawrence River flooding.

Chairman Gray said 2019 was a great year that had its challenges and the Board met them along with help from staff, and 2020 will bring as many, if not more challenges with the policies being handed down by the State affecting us. He thanked legislators for their efforts and cooperation in

2019 and said he looks forward to working with them, administration and staff to take on the challenges of 2020. He wished everyone a very happy holiday season.

There being no further business of the Board, on a motion by Legislator Fitzpatrick seconded by Legislator Johnson and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p.m.
