REGULAR SESSION

TUESDAY, MARCH 3, 2020

Chairman Gray called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

ROLL CALL OF MEMBERS

All members present.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR

Noah Latham 8217C South Lewis Ave., Fort Drum addressed the Board saying that over 3,500 signatures were gained in only a few short weeks to ask that Jefferson County be established as a Second Amendment Sanctuary County. For many years people throughout the United States have witnessed rights afforded them through the Bill of Rights and the Constitution be eroded. Numerous demonstrations have been held throughout the country in the last few months in particular objecting to having their Second Amendment right tread upon. He said it is time for the people of Jefferson County to make this stand for their rights with conviction. He asked that legislators pass the ordinance contained in the petition making Jefferson County a Second Amendment Sanctuary County as that is the desire of the people.

Steven Byers, 17227 Cook Road, Watertown, expressed disappointment in Sheriff O'Neill's preemptive press release saying she did not support efforts to make Jefferson County a Sanctuary County. He spoke in favor of making Jefferson County a Second Amendment Sanctuary County and felt it was important to fight for our constitutional rights locally because our freedoms face a much greater attack here in New York State then anything we are presently facing overseas. He relayed personal experience in the fact that people will leave Jefferson County and New York State because of taxes, regulations and things like the SAFE Act. He felt the New York State government has gone too far with their own agenda that targets the rights of its citizens, and strongly urged legislators to vote in favor of the petition as a first step in taking the State back for its citizens.

Jon Hall, 1381 Washington Street, Watertown, commended Sheriff O'Neill for reaffirming her Oath of Office in committing her Department will not pick and choose which laws they enforce, and ensure all laws are enforced to the best of their ability. Everyone has their own interpretation of the Second Amendment and the one that counts is the interpretation from our courts that law enforcement agencies have pledged to enforce. He said gun violence on a large scale can happen anywhere people gather, and the extreme ends of the gun control issue are the ones making all the noise; both banning guns or ensuring everyone has a gun is unrealistic and adds nothing to solving the gun violence issue. Realistic gun control measures will ensure everyone's safety, but when there is no positive engagement between opposing views, you get unilateral legislation like the NY SAFE Act, which he supports. Jefferson County as a Second Amendment Sanctuary County would restrict engagement on the gun violence issue and would run counter to ensuring law enforcement has the ability to protect its citizens and defend the

Constitution that protects us all. He urged legislators not to approve Jefferson County as a Second Amendment Sanctuary County.

James Pelletier, 705 Greensview Dr., Watertown spoke in opposition to the NY SAFE Act and hoped it is overturned by the Supreme Court. He also felt it was very important for Jefferson County to become a Second Amendment Sanctuary County. As a medical provider he felt Red Flag Laws are a very slippery slope as where do we draw the line on who is qualified to say if someone should own a gun or not. He advocated for looking at the big picture as there are inherent risks in everything we do. He expressed disappointment in Sheriff O'Neill's position, but gave her credit for calling him back when he contacted her. He felt the Second Amendment was written in a time when people were afraid of their government and it gave them protections for their families and he is a firm believer in that.

Charles Kingsley, 8384 State Park Road, Three Mile Bay, spoke in favor of Jefferson County becoming a Second Amendment Sanctuary County. He said we all need to be our own first defense and it is clear from the news media and legislation, that right is trying to be taken away. He added it is unfortunate that legislation, so many times, in all our effort to do a good thing, ends up punishing a large percentage of the population to correct one issue.

Noah Latham delivered petitions containing 3,582 signatures from citizens asking that Jefferson County be named a Second Amendment Sanctuary County.

LOCAL LAWS, RESOLUTIONS AND MOTIONS

Chairman Gray entertained a motion to waive the Standing Rules to permit the introduction of three additional resolutions for consideration that had not gone through the jurisdictional committee process. Such motion was made by Legislator Peck seconded by Legislator Ferris and unanimously carried.

Resolution No. 92

Opposing Infringements on the Inalienable Right to Keep and Bear Arms, and Affirming Support for the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution

Whereas, Every person possesses inalienable rights, among these, life, liberty, property, the pursuit of happiness, and the right to keep and bear arms in defense of these inalienable rights, and

Whereas, The Declaration of Independence asserts, "it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish" "any form of government" that becomes destructive toward the people's natural rights including the right to keep and bear arms against all enemies, foreign or domestic, and

Whereas, Proposed legislation by the State of New York will infringe on the rights of the people of the state especially the right to keep and bear arms, and

Whereas, The 2013 New York Secure Ammunition and Firearms Enforcement Act (NY SAFE Act), passed with a spurious message of necessity, with no public debate, and

Whereas, The NY SAFE Act criminalized standard-capacity magazines and added arbitrary and capricious regulations with the intent of discouraging compliance by implementing many onerous requirements, and

Whereas, The State enacted legislation passed in 2019:

- To legalize the confiscation of property without due process;
- To grant private information about citizen's gun ownership to police agencies without a warrant or probable cause of the commission of a crime, and

Whereas, Certain members of the Senate and the Assembly have announced their intent to further infringe on the right to keep and bear arms with several proposed bills including:

- Assembly Bill A773 which criminalizes the possession of a digitally-made firearm or magazine;
- Assembly Bill A1724 which restricts the sale of ammunition for so-called "assault weapons";

- Senate Bill S1038 which restricts the sale of ammunition;
- Senate Bill S1413 which requires social media and search engine reviews prior to gun purchases;
- Senate Bill S4868 which requires owners of firearms to obtain liability insurance;
- Senate Bill S6716 which prohibits the possession of unfinished receivers;
- Senate Bill S7762 which prohibits the possession of unfinished receivers;

Whereas, In the words of Thomas Jefferson and Cesare Beccaria, "The laws that forbid the carrying of arms ... disarm only those who are neither inclined or determined to commit crimes ... Such laws make things worse for the assaulted and better for the assailants ..."

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That this Board of Legislators encourages all people of Jefferson County to exercise their inalienable right to keep and bear arms, to obtain arms and ammunition, and to train to a level of proficiency, so that they may, in the words of Alexander Hamilton in Federalist #28, "stand ready to defend their own rights and those of their fellow citizens" and be it further

Resolved, That this Board of Legislators strongly supports the right to keep and bear arms and the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution, and be it further

Resolved, That this Board of Legislators stands in opposition to any proposed legislation that would intentionally violate the inalienable rights of the people of Jefferson County and seeks the repeal of any state law, act, or regulation:

- Registering or tracking firearms, accessories, ammunition, or their owners;
- Forbidding or restricting the possession, ownership, transfer, or the constitutionallyguaranteed use of any type of firearm, firearm accessory, or ammunition by citizens of the legal age of eighteen and over, other than pursuant to federal law;
- Ordering the confiscation of firearms, firearm accessories, or ammunition from citizens; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be provided to Jefferson County's State and Federal Representatives, the Speaker of the New York State Assembly, the Temporary President of the New York State Senate, and the Governor of the State of New York.

Seconded by Legislator: Patrick R. Jareo

Legislator Jareo thanked all the people that took time to come to the meeting, he said it is good to see citizens exercising their right to redress their government, and he shares their concerns. He said the Second Amendment and Home Rule are cornerstones of our republic and State Government is jack hammering them. He added that we can not stand by and let this happen as our ancestors fought and died so we have the liberty that God intended, and it is our duty to maintain those rights. He whole-heartedly supported the resolution.

Legislator Montigelli stated that the New York State Governor, Senate and Assembly have

agreed to have certain rules and laws that infringe upon rights of people who do not live in urban areas. New York State has 62 counties and Jefferson County has a population of 114,000 people, Lewis County 25,000, St. Lawrence 50,000; there are five counties that make up New York City, there are three more that are in proximity to New York City, and those eight counties together are 13 million people; people can vote, vacant land does not vote. What is going on in Albany needs to change, but it only changes if people actually come together and elect people of like mind, and we would have more reasonable rules for people who are not in New York City. He acknowledged that the SAFE Act did get passed when the Senate had a Republican majority, however there needs to be a better balance of power in Albany in order for things to change.

Legislator Drake said he represents a very rural area that depend on firearms for protection for many reasons, and the State Legislation is faulty, very restrictive and the insurance provisions alone create a hardship for people in his district on the lower end of the economic scale. He agreed with background checks for guns and he supported banning assault rifles. As a teacher, early on in his career, guns could be found in the vehicles in the high school parking lot, now schools are on lock down and you have to be buzzed in, which he agreed with. His greatest fear is the shootings that happen in schools. Because of the provisions associated with assault rifles he was going to ask for permission to abstain from voting on the resolution, but agreed with about 90% of what it states.

Legislator Fitzpatrick said legislators are part of "the people" and represent everyone in the County including those who are present. Legislators do not always agree with the Governor either, and she does not agreed with him on this issue. The millions of people in New York City referenced by Legislator Montigelli are why New York is called a Democratic State, and there are approximately 57-60 Assemblymen and women in New York City vs. 3 for the North Country. She said even though most Board members are Republican, they don't always vote the same. She did not agree with all of the resolution, but would support it because she agreed that we have the right to bear arms in Jefferson County.

Legislator Ferris said he has had a conceal to carry permit for a long time and went through the background check and registers all new weapons like he is supposed to so they can be added to his permit. He said people who say that there needs to be more strict rules on guns obviously do not live in New York State where it is pretty strict already. He was happy to see the resolution come forward and would support it as it is time to push back at what is being proposed.

Legislator Maxon said because the resolution did not go through the Committee process the text of it is not widely known, noting that copies were available as people entered the room. He felt it important to reference the fact that the resolution is designed to send a message to the government in Albany that certain rights, no matter what laws are past, are inalienable, inherent and God given, and the right to keep and bear arms against tyranny is important. This is not a law that has been passed, it is not a grant of a right from government, it is a restriction on government, the right to keep and bear arms can not be infringed upon as it is a defense against tyranny. He encouraged all the people in Jefferson County to exercise their inalienable right to keep and bear arms, to keep and obtain ammunition and to train to allow a level of efficiency so that they may, in the words of Alexander Hamilton "stand ready to defend their own rights, and

those of their fellow citizens". He was excited that so many people attended the meeting, had their voice heard, and the Board is able to respond tonight, and not refer it to a committee, to say we have spent time considering this, have heard your concerns, and are ready to offer what we can offer. He whole-heartedly expressed support for the resolution.

There being no further discussion, all members present voted aye except Legislator Drake who abstained.

Resolution No. 70

Requesting Introduction of Legislation Extending the Authorization of a One Percent Increase in the County Sales and Compensating Use Tax in Jefferson County

Whereas, By Resolution Nos. 135, and 169 of 2004, this Board of Legislators requested the introduction of a bill in the State Legislature to amend the New York State Tax Law to allow the County of Jefferson to impose an additional sales tax of three quarters of one percent (3/4%) through November 30, 2005, and following introduction of legislation concurred in and authorized the home rule request of the Chairman of this Board for its enactment; said legislation was subsequently passed by the State Legislature and signed into law by the Governor, and

Whereas, By Resolution Nos. 32 and 114 of 2005, Resolution Nos. 31 and 115 of 2007, Resolution Nos. 32 and 95 of 2009, Resolution Nos. 48 and 104 of 2011, Resolution Nos. 97 and 138 of 2013, Resolution Nos. 80 and 116 of 2015, and Resolution Nos. 75 and 136 of 2017 this Board of Legislators requested the introduction of a bill in the State Legislature to amend the New York State Tax Law to allow the County of Jefferson to impose an additional sales tax of

three quarters of one percent (3/4%) through November 30, 2007, November 30, 2009, November 30, 2011, November 30, 2013, and November 30, 2015, and one percent (1%) through November 30, 2017, and November 30, 2020 respectively; and following introduction of legislation concurred in and authorized the home rule request of the Chairman of this Board for its enactment; and said legislation was subsequently passed by the State Legislature and signed into law by the Governor, and

Whereas, The County now requires the continuation of one percent of said sales tax revenue in order to continue to stabilize the property tax levy and retain important local government services.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That this Board hereby requests that Senator Patty Ritchie and Assemblymen Mark Walczyk, Ken Blankenbush and William Barclay introduce appropriate legislation in the New York State Legislature which would authorize Jefferson County to continue to impose an additional one percent rate of sales and compensating use tax through November 30, 2023, and be it further

Resolved, That the Chairman of this Board be and is hereby authorized and directed to forthwith communicate the foregoing request of this Board to the aforesaid State Legislators.

Legislator Montigelli pointed out that this is one of the things we have to ask permission from New York State to do every two years as it is Home Rule legislation and concern for rural areas just doesn't exist. Chairman Gray confirmed that it was and said it is the first step in a three step process to receive permission from the State for Jefferson County to continue charging one percent in sales tax. Authorizing Agreements and Amending the 2020 County Budget in Relation to U.S. Economic Development Administration Grant

Whereas, Jefferson County is required to periodically update its Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) to assist in maintaining eligibility for Federal economic development public works funds, and

Whereas, The U.S. Economic Development Administration (USEDA) has approved a \$78,000 project including \$39,000 grant funds and requiring \$39,000 local match, to complete the CEDS update, and

Whereas, The 2020 County Budget currently includes a \$10,000 allocation for this project, and

Whereas, The Jefferson County Industrial Development Agency (JCIDA) will also provide \$7,500 in funds to this project, and

Whereas, The County CEDS Committee will conduct a Request for Proposals process to select a consultant to perform the CEDS update at a cost not to exceed \$56,500, and

Whereas, The remaining local match funds will not be accounted for in the county Budget,

including \$10,000 that the Thousand Islands International Tourism Council (TIITC) will expend for a thorough assessment of its attractions and supporting tourism infrastructure, and also inkind staff time of \$5,000 from the County, \$5,000 from JCIDA, and \$1,500 from TIITC, and

Legislator Jareo said he agrees with the concerns expressed by members of the public who spoke tonight regarding their Second Amendment but that is not the only infringement he is concerned with. For several years he has objected to the Stonegarden grant which is part of this resolution. He said the grant is used by the federal government to encourage local entities to cooperate with border patrol. The problem with this cooperation is that in many instances across the nation, and even to our North in St. Lawrence County, it has been used to infringe on the Fourth and Fifth Amendment rights of our citizens, and we must vigilantly guard all of our rights. For those reasons, he could not support this resolution.

Legislator Maxon stated that the citizens here this evening are expressing their desire to peacefully have government infringements on their Second Amendment rights rolled back; the Patriot Act, the SAFE Act and Red Flag laws are all examples of government infringements on their Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Amendment rights. Stonegarden funds purchase surveillance equipment, weapons and advance training for law enforcement personnel to cooperate with Border Patrol to heighten security, and represent an infringement of these rights. He and Legislator Jareo have been speaking out about this for years to no avail, resolutions are passed and funds reappropriated. He offered an alternative tonight and moved that the resolution be amended to remove those funds and the County Administrator, Budget Officer, County Treasurer, and Sheriff be directed to return the unused Stonegarden grant funds to the federal government with our thanks. The motion was seconded by Legislator Jareo and defeated with Legislators Maxon and Jareo in favor and all other members present opposed to the amendment.

Supporting a Permanent Funding Floor Model for Community College Base State Aid Formula Fiscal Year 2020-2021

Whereas, Under State Law, funding for community colleges is to be provided through state aid, a county sponsor contribution, and student tuition and fees, and

Whereas, The establishment and continued operation of a statewide community college system was based on an ongoing state aid funding commitment of up to 40% of community college operating costs, and

Whereas, The state funding amount is now well below its stated commitment level, and

Whereas, The Legislature and Governor have been providing modest increases in state aid the last few years, but that commitment remains far below the intended 40% commitment, and

Whereas, Community colleges serve nearly half of all undergraduates enrolled in the SUNY System along with nearly as many life-long learners through non-credit classes, and

Whereas, A level of predictability in State funding is essential to provide community colleges the ability to plan and budget accordingly and recognizes each college's annual fixed costs, and

Whereas, The language added to the community college funding model for fiscal year 2019-2020

providing for 98% of the previous year or \$100 increase per FTE, whichever is greater, was a step in the right direction and appreciated, and

Whereas, This new funding floor model should be set in State statute at 100% of the previous year or \$100 increase per FTE, whichever is greater.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That Jefferson County fully supports the proposal that New York State change the base state aid formula allocation for each community college to be permanently set at 100% of the previous year or \$100 increase per FTE, whichever is greater, and be it further

Resolved, That Jefferson County in concert with both SUNY & NYSAC calls on the Governor and State Legislature to make every effort to restore the floor funding model for community college operating costs established in fiscal year 2019-2020, and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution should be sent to Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, the New York State Legislature, Jefferson Community College, SUNY, NYSAC and all others deemed necessary and proper.

Legislator McBride asked for clarification on the resolution. Chairman Gray explained that before last year, JCC funding from New York State was based on a full time equivalent (FTE) model for student enrollment with a three year rolling average and a percentage assigned each year. He said funding for JCC comes from three sources State Aid, Sponsor share (County), and student tuition. Last year the State Legislature enacted the floor model so that if enrollment dipped, the funding level would only go down to 98% of the previous year so the largest loss would be 2% annually. This floor model was not proposed in the Governor's budget, and in this resolution we are asking the State Legislature to put it back in the budget in order to create some consistency in community colleges budgeting so there is not such a roller coaster, as is the case with the FTE model.

Mr. Hagemann added that if the floor model is not added back into the State budget then JCC stands to lose \$660,000 in State Aid. Legislator McBride questioned what the College will do to make up the funds. Chairman Gray stated that the difference would have to be made up of additional aid from the Sponsor, raising tuition, budget cuts, or a combination of all of those. He said when enrollment is down making cuts is difficult as you want all programming to continue, and any programming changes are made by the JCC Board of Trustees. Legislator Peck added that at a recent meeting at the College they provided a graph that clearly defined the issue in terms of State Aid which has the College on par now with aid received in 2007 before enrollment declined. It outlined the swing of the FTE model and how the floor model is justified and will help buoy the finances as they continue to offer the same programming to all students including non-traditional, not just the FTE students.

Legislator Montigelli commenting in line with his earlier comments about the balance of power,

said he attended a State Budget presentation made by the Governor's representative, Executive Director Matt Discoll recently here in Watertown who stated that Community Colleges' will receive an increase. When asked by Legislator Montigelli about JCC receiving a decrease of \$600,000 in aid Mr. Driscoll said he was not aware of that and would need to get back to him, and he has not heard back as of yet. There being no further discussion, all members present voted aye, except Legislator McBride who voted nay.

Authorizing Agreements and Amending the 2020 County Budget in Relation to Consolidated Funding Application for a Census 2020 Complete Count Outreach Grant with the Empire State Development

Whereas, The Watertown Jefferson County Complete Count Committee has been working with the North Country Library System (NCLS) to utilize their facilities and connections in the communities, and

Legislator Reed thanked Deputy Administrator Sarah Baldwin for the background work she did in putting together a letter to our federal representatives concerning the cormorant issue on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River which helped to kick off the public comment period for the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Management Service. He said the comment period ends on March 9th and he encouraged anyone that has a strong opinion on the ever-increasing cormorant population and how it is decimating the fisheries and people's property, log in and leave comments on their website. Legislator Jareo reiterated Legislator Reed's comments and encouraged anyone that fishes to get online and leave public comment about the problems/issues with comments and be heard.

Legislator Maxon thanked those present for coming to the meeting and expressing their views. He said that the County handles many and various issues that are generally boring from cormorants, waterfront redevelopment, waterfront high water to the Department of Social Services that do things that affect peoples everyday lives, and spend \$265 million a year and no one comes to the budget meetings. He said the Board has meetings almost every Tuesday evening and encouraged people to attend and make their views known.

There being no further business to come before the Board, on a motion by Legislator Maxon seconded by Legislator Ferris and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned at 7:20 p.m.
