Chairman Gray called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

ROLL CALL OF MEMBERS

Public Hearing

Tentative 2022 County Budget

Larry Sorrell, 1 Thompson Park, Watertown, and Executive Director, Thompson Park Conservancy and Zoo New York thanked the Board for their historic and continued support of the Zoo. He appreciated that the Board wants to be good stewards of public dollars, and said the NYS Paycheck Protection Program funding they received was for 2020 and 2021 and they do not anticipate receiving that funding for 2022; whereas, the \$6,000 increase they requested from the County is for 2022. He said they continue to be impacted by relatively unprecedented inflation, and the increase in minimum wage; the Zoo is 75% funded by self-generated income in admissions, memberships and donations which have also been negatively impacted the last few years and that is anticipated to continue. He asked that legislators consider the over all impact to their operations in making funding decisions, thanked legislators for their past support, and looked forward to moving forward in a positive way.

No one else present wished to speak and Chairman Gray closed the hearing at 6:05 p.m.

LOCAL LAWS, RESOLUTIONS AND MOTIONS

Resolution No. 238

Revising and Adopting 2022 Tentative Budget

By Legislator: James A. Nabywaniec

Whereas, Pursuant to Section 357 of the County Law, the Finance and Rules Committee of this Board has reviewed the Budget Officer's 2022 Tentative Budget and has proposed that certain changes, alterations and revisions be made to said budget.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the 2022 Budget Officer's Tentative Budget be changed, altered and revised as shown on the attached Schedule A, said schedule shall be considered a part of this resolution as if fully set forth herein, and be it further

Resolved, That said Tentative Budget, with such changes, alterations and revisions as are heretofore set forth be and is hereby adopted as the Budget of the County of Jefferson for County fiscal year 2022.

Seconded by Legislator: Allen T. Drake

(This resolution references changes that were made to the Budget however the Finance & Rules Committee did not make any changes so there is no Schedule A from the Finance & Rules Committee)

Legislator Nabywaniec made a motion to amend the Tentative Budget to remove the 3% increase for all of the authorized agencies, except the North Country Library System, Jefferson County Historical Society, and the Volunteer Transportation Center who will retain the 3% increase; with the savings to fall back to fund balance. The motion was seconded by Legislator Reed.

Chairman Gray did not support the amendment as the agencies are accustomed to not asking for more funding and they do so at the request of the Budget Officer with the understanding that they will periodically receive an increase. He said not giving them an increase because they didn't ask is unfair, especially when some of them have requested additional funding in the past and been turned down; and four agencies asked for additional funding this year and only one is being funded. Also, this would not decrease taxes as the money is going back to fund balance, equates to less than a 1% increase per year since their last increase, and in the past (2018) all legislators approved an across the board increase for authorized agencies without comment. He had not heard and did not agree that the budget process is flawed, as the Board asks the Budget Officer to make recommendations, the Board then makes recommendations/changes and we move forward. He also did not agree with including certain agencies in order to gain votes as that brings politics into decision making.

Chairman Gray said he takes his fiduciary responsibilities very seriously, and in 2019 every agency came through the Finance & Rules Committee explaining their services and how they were using County dollars to leverage other dollars. There didn't appear to be any opposition at that time to any agency, although attendance at those meetings was lacking. He said these agencies provide a lot of community service and he felt a 3% increase was reasonable. He suggested that if the agencies 3% increase is taken away, the legislators should rescind their 3% salary increase because they never asked for it.

Legislator Jareo appreciated Chairman Gray's comments said he did not think there was anything wrong with negotiation and compromise between colleagues to get any amendment or resolution through as there are fifteen members of the Board with different views. He also said possibly he was not loud enough with his objections to the flawed budget process in the past because he has been saying it for years, continually.

Legislator Drake did not support the amendment as a 3% raise over two years is not unreasonable and the agencies provide a great service to the community. He agreed with the Chairman's comments as cutting the 3% will not save us money, and a lot of the agencies are worthy and he did not want hurt them or start picking apart who gets the money and who doesn't, however he was glad that the North Country Library System will receive an increase as he has four small libraries in his District.

Legislator Montigelli remembered words from former Legislator Carolyn Fitzpatrick relating the exercise that the Board went through in the past to bring legislators salaries up to an equitable position. He did not support the amendment as it would undo what has been done in the past to keep things equitable.

Whereas, Jefferson County has received \$10,666,983.50 in ARPA funding, and

Whereas, This funding will be allocated to meet small business, landlords and non-for-profit organization needs; address agriculture and tourism sector challenges; replace lost County revenue, strengthen County services and address infrastructure needs, and

Whereas, The Board has identified much of the funding for allocation, with the remainder to be allocated in the future.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that Jefferson County hereby accepts said funding and authorizes the Chairman of the Board of Legislators to sign any and all documents necessary to accept such funding, subject to the approval of the County Attorney and County Administrator as to form and content, and be it further

Granting their \$100,000 request is just enough to make up the difference between their current reimbursement rate of 44¢ per mile and the federal rate of 59¢ per mile, and will allow them to retain their volunteers. He felt this was a worthy use of the ARPA money.

Resolution No. 245

Bond Resolution of the County of Jefferson, New York, Authorizing the Issuance of \$2,000,000 Serial Bonds to Finance Fifty Percent of the Cost of Construction of an Athletics Turf Field to be Undertaken by Jefferson Community College

By Legislator: Robert W. Cantwell, III

Whereas, By Resolution 181 of 2019, this County Board of Legislators committed to issue debt for fifty percent of the cost of an Athletics Turf Field at Jefferson Community College, and

Whereas, By College Resolution 165 of 2021, the Board of Trustees acknowledged SUNY capital funding to support fifty percent of the Turf Field Project.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, By the County Board of Legislators (the "Board of Legislators") of the County of Jefferson, New York (the "County") as follows:

- Section 1. The County is hereby authorized to pay fifty percent (50%) of the costs of the construction of an Athletics Turf field on the main campus of Jefferson Community College, including grading and improvement of the site and equipment, machinery or apparatus required for the purposes for which such constructed field is to be used, at an aggregate estimated maximum cost of \$2,000,000.
- Section 2. It is hereby determined that the aggregate maximum estimated cost of the aforesaid specific objects or purposes to be financed by the County is \$2,000,000, said amount is hereby appropriated therefor, and the plan for the financing thereof shall consist of the issuance of \$2,000,000 in serial bonds (the "Bonds") of the County which are authorized to be issued pursuant to this resolution and the provisions of the Local Finance Law.
- Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific objects or purposes is fifteen (15) years pursuant to subparagraph (a)(1), subdivision 12 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.
- Section 4. Pursuant to Section 107.00(d)(9) of the Local Finance Law, current funds are not required to be provided prior to issuance of the Bonds or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of issuance of the Bonds. If Section 107.00(d)(9) of the Local Finance Law is not in effect and current funds are required to be provided prior to issuance of the Bonds or any bond anticipation notes authorized by this resolution, the appropriate amount of funds required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law shall be provided prior to the issuance of such Bonds or bond anticipation notes.
- Section 5. The temporary use of available funds of the County, not immediately required for the purpose or purposes for which the same were borrowed, raised or otherwise

created, is hereby authorized pursuant to Section 165.10 of the Local Finance Law, for the capital purposes described in Section 1 of this resolution.

- Section 6. The Bonds, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the Bonds, shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and the Bonds, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the Bonds shall be general obligations of the County, payable as to both principal and interest by a general tax upon all the real property within the County without legal or constitutional limitation as to rate or amount. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the Bonds, and provision shall be made annually in the budget of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the Bonds and bond anticipation notes to mature in such year, and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.
- Section 7. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Local Finance Law, and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 21.00, 30.00, 50.00 and 56.00 to 63.00, inclusive, of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the Bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, the power to prescribe the terms, form and contents of the Bonds, and any bond anticipation notes, the power to sell and deliver the Bonds and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds, and the power to issue bonds providing for level or substantially level or declining annual debt service, is hereby delegated to the County Treasurer, the Chief Fiscal Officer of the County.
- Section 8. The Bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized to be issued by this resolution are hereby authorized to be consolidated, at the option of the County Treasurer, the Chief Fiscal Officer of the County, with the serial bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized by bond resolutions previously adopted by the Board of Legislators for purposes of sale into one or more bond or note issues aggregating an amount not to exceed the amount authorized in such resolutions. All matters regarding the sale of the Bonds, including the dated date of the Bonds, the consolidation of the Bonds and bond anticipation notes with other issues of the County and the serial maturities of the Bonds are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer, the Chief Fiscal Officer of the County.
- Section 9. The validity of the Bonds or of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of the Bonds may be contested only if:
 - (a) (i) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
 - (ii) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution or a summary thereof are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or

(b) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of New York.

Section 10. The County Treasurer, the Chief Fiscal Officer of the County, is hereby authorized to enter into an undertaking for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds from time to time, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of the Bonds, requiring the County to provide secondary market disclosure as required by Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12.

Section 11. The reasonably expected source of funds to be used to initially pay for the expenditures authorized by Section 1 of this resolution shall be from the County's General Fund. It is intended that the County shall then reimburse such expenditures with the proceeds of the Bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized by this resolution and that the interest payable on the Bonds and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the Bonds shall be excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. This resolution shall constitute the declaration of the County's "official intent" to reimburse the expenditures authorized by this resolution with the proceeds of the Bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized herein, as required by Treasury Department Regulation Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 12. This resolution, or a summary hereof, shall be published in the Watertown Daily Times, the official newspaper of the County, together with a notice of the Clerk of the Board of Legislators, in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Financial Law.

Section 13. This resolution is not subject to a mandatory or permissive referendum.

Section 14. The Board of Legislators hereby determines that the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act and the regulations thereunder have previously been satisfied with respect to the expenditures authorized by this resolution.

Section 15. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Resolution No. 246

Increasing the Sliding Scale Income Eligibility Range for Partial Real Property Tax Exemptions for Certain Individuals Sixty-Five Years of Age or Over.

By Legislator: Patrick R. Jareo

Whereas, The Jefferson County Board of Supervisors established a sliding scale for income eligibility for a partial real property tax exemption for certain individuals sixty-five years of age or over, pursuant to section 467 of the Real Property Tax Law by Resolution No. 201-A of 1985, and

Whereas, The Sliding scale was modified by Resolutions Nos. 385 of 1988, 87 of 1990, 42 of 1991, 6 of 1995, and 196 of 2005 in order to increase the level of income eligible for such exemption, and

Whereas, The income eligibility levels have not been increased for over 15 years, nor adjusted in relation to the Federal Poverty Income Guideline which stands at \$17,430 for a two person household for 2021, and

Whereas, It is the Board of Legislator's desire at this time to increase the income levels of eligibility for the partial real property tax exemption for individuals 65 years of age and over.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That pursuant to section 467 of the Real Property Tax law there is hereby established a sliding scale of income eligibility for a partial real property tax exemption for certain individuals sixty-five years of age or over, and said income levels and percentages of exemption being as follows:

Annual Income	Percentage of Assessed Valuation Exempt from Taxation
Less than or equal to \$17,400	50 per centum
More than \$17,400, but less than or equal to \$18,400	45 per centum

Legislator Peck reminded legislators of the Jefferson County Soil & Water Conservation District Open House on December 2nd from 11:30-3:00 at their offices in Burrville, noting that Executive Director Christine Watkins will be retiring soon.

County Attorney David Paulsen advised that there was new activity on the opioid litigation that can not wait for Board approval until the December meeting, as there is a deadline for decisions of November 19th. His intention is to have the Clerk of the Board call a Special Board meeting before General Services Committee next week.. He hoped to have information out to the Board by the end of this week regarding what the issues will be.

In a nutshell, he said there are a couple settlements to be approved and the biggest issue is discussing the overall settlement distribution agreement that is in place for New York State whereby the monies from any settlement received by a municipality within New York State will go through the Opioid Settlement Fund and be distributed out into regional areas. He said it is a complicated scheme and there will probably be a lot of questions so he wanted to make sure there was enough time to discuss it and a special meeting is the best time to do that.

Chairman Gray inquired if the Board would be approving all of the settlements individually and an aggregate amount will be approved in the end.

Attorney Paulsen did not believe an overall total may be evident, but small percentages of the money from the State fund will be distributed to the municipalities in cash; larger percentages will be divided up regionally for specific opioid services. He needed an answer from our counsel as to whether we have an option to join in to the State distribution agreement, or whether we are

mandated to join in by State law; he knew she does recommend that we join in as we will get better treatment then default distribution agreements with each individual settlement, with each individual defendant. He wasn't sure we would know what a total dollar figure would be, but with each settlement there should be an analysis of how it will be distributed to us individually cash wise and how much will go to our region that will be available for opioid services.

In response to questions Community Services Director Tim Ruetten advised that he understands approximately \$1 million - \$1.8 million over a 10-15 year period, which will be about \$100,000 per year is what we will receive in funding from the settlements.

With regard to whether communities that didn't even join the lawsuit(s) will be entitled to some of the pool of funding, Attorney Paulsen said it appears that is the case from the agreement he has seen, any provider of opioid services (hospitals, rehabilitation centers, counseling, etc.) is able to apply to the State fund for reimbursement grants. He said he did not believe any money would come to the County, it will go from the State directly to the providers for care, and he doesn't think it will be related at all to who has brought suit and who hasn't. He said the cash portion coming directly to municipalities may be directed more towards some that have a suit and some that haven't, but he doesn't have answers to those questions tonight.

There being no further business of the Board, on a motion by Legislator Ferris seconded by Legislator Doldo and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned at 7:00 p.m.
