REGULAR SESSION

TUESDAY, JUNE 5, 2018

Chairman Gray called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

ROLL CALL OF MEMBERS

All members present except Legislator Fitzpatrick.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR

District 15 Legislator Anthony Doldo provided the Board with information concerning the annual chicken barbeque fund-raising event at the North Pole Fire Department that benefits the law enforcement K-9s in Jefferson County. He said it began in April, 2016 through the efforts of Probation Officer and North Pole Fire Chief Joseph Wargo and Assistant District Attorney Christina Curry. Ms. Curry recognized the need for K-9's to have protective body armor which drove the formation of the event, and has also formed the Animal Cruelty Task Force through the District Attorney's Office. Legislator Doldo further recognized 6th Grade student Gianna Wood as she had seen publicity of the event and wanted to also help out, so instead of gifts for her 12th birthday she collected donations for the law enforcement K-9s and raised the incredible total of \$1,046. Legislator Doldo said the grand total for both fund raising efforts is \$6,450, which will allow each of the K-9 programs to received a check for \$2,150. He said these three individuals have demonstrated outstanding leadership, dedication to the community and a commitment to the K-9 program. He presented checks to each of the K-9 programs in the County, City and State Police for their share of the proceeds from this years' events.

Chairman Gray, Watertown City Mayor Joseph Butler, and NYS Police Lieutenant Rob Simpson presented certificates to Gianna Wood, Assistant District Attorney Christina Curry, and Northpole Fire Chief and Probation Officer Joseph Wargo in recognition of their exceptional fund raising efforts in support of the K-9 programs for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, Watertown City Police and the New York State Police, respectively.

amounts paid by such individuals as shown on said Exhibit, and be it further

Resolved, That the County Attorney is hereby authorized to file with the Court a motion seeking an Order to vacate the Judgement of Foreclosure, discontinuing the *in rem* tax foreclosure action and cancelling the Notice of Pendency of such action in regard to the respective parcel(s) of property.

Legislator Peck asked for more of an explanation of this program and how it is proposed to be executed. Mr. Hagemann advised that it is part of the \$1 million grant awarded to the City of Watertown to assist with poverty and the money will be used to contract with a provider who will coach/counsel citizens in order to keep them employed. He said they will assist with life issues that may be barriers to these individuals working their way out of poverty and staying employed. The program has been utilized and successful in other areas of the country over the past several years, and helps people get through the crisis of the day in order to keep them working. Funding will be through the Employment & Training Department as they deal with people trying to find work, it is for citizens within the City of Watertown but may be more broad, it requires a 50/50 funding match from the employer, and the provider is Schenectady Works. Legislator Maxon asked when the grant funds are no longer available if the program will end or if the County will be expected to pick up the cost. Mr. Hagemann advised that there is an initial government subsidy, but the hope is that employers will see the success rate of the program and how valuable the program is and hire the firm to assist their employees at 100% of the cost.

Resolution No. 124

Authorizing the Lease of Lands of the Thousand Island Bridge Authority to the State of New York for a Period Greater than Ten Years

Whereas, Pursuant to Article 3, Title 4 of the Public Authorities Law of the State of New York the Thousand Island Bridge Authority was created as a public benefit corporation, and

Whereas, Section 578(4) of the Public Authorities Law authorizes the Thousand Island Bridge Authority (hereinafter "TIBA") to lease real property in its ownership for a period of no more than ten years without the express formal approval of the Jefferson County Board of Legislators, and

Whereas, The State of New York, acting through the Office of General Services, proposes to locate a New York welcome center on land of the TIBA under a lease with an initial term of 49 years and six five year extensions, and

Whereas, The Welcome Center represents a significant investment on the part of New York State and will showcase the Jefferson County/Northern New York area thereby attracting additional tourism, and

Whereas, The Board of Legislators desires to support and encourage the development of a New York welcome center at the Thousand Island Bridge.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Board of Legislators hereby approves and consents to a real property lease between the TIBA and the State of New York for the period set forth above and the Chairman of the Board is authorized to execute any further document necessary to effectuate this purpose, subject to the approval of the County Attorney as to form and content.

Conditionally Authorizing Sale of Real Property to the Village of Ellisburg, New York.

Whereas, Tax Map Parcel Nos. 117.82-1-19.1, 117.82-1-20, 117.82-1-21 in the Town of Ellisburg are subject to multiple years of delinquent real property taxes and a residential structure on one of the parcels is in poor condition due to fire damage, and

Whereas, Village of Ellisburg has proposed to the County of Jefferson that it will purchase the parcels for the sum of \$4,000.00, demolish the structure and re-purpose the parcels or sell them for redevelopment, and

Whereas, It is in the best interest of the County of Jefferson to contract to sell the parcels to a buyer with the intent and ability to demolish the structure prior to perfecting its tax foreclosure title so as not to risk being unable to sell a property with significant building code issues, and

Whereas, The contract of sale with the Village of Ellisburg will be conditional on the County acquiring title through real property tax foreclosure, require the purchaser to pay purchase price of \$4,000.00, pay deed recording costs, and contain a "put" clause requiring the purchaser to assume title upon tender of a deed by County, and

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That should the County come into title of the above referenced parcels as a result of foreclosure, the parcels shall be sold to the Village of Ellisburg for the sum

of \$4,000.00 on the condition that in the event that the Village subsequently sells any or all of the parcels, the County will be entitled to that part of the purchase price representing the balance between the \$4,000.00 purchase price and the balance of delinquent taxes extinguished by the tax foreclosure collectively on the three parcels, with the Village to bear the costs of any applicable filing and recording costs, and the Chairman of the Board and the County Attorney are authorized to execute any documents necessary to accomplish such conveyance, and it is further

Resolved, That prior to the County taking a judgment of foreclosure in regard to said parcel, the Chairman of the Board of Legislators be and hereby is authorized to execute a Contract of Purchase and Sale with the Village of Ellisburg, providing for the sale of said parcel to the Village as outlined above, with the following further conditions in said contract: a "put" clause whereby the County may compel the Village to take title to the parcel from the County.

Resolution No. 131

Accepting Funding and Authorizing an Agreement in Connection With Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program

Whereas, The Jefferson County Public Health Service has been reallocated \$94,952 for a 1 year term renewal from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Health Research, Inc. (HRI) of the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) for the period 07/01/18-06/30/19 to improve its capacity to address Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) functions, and

Whereas, The Public Health Service will use these funds to further develop its plan and improve capacities to respond to public health threats pursuant to guidelines developed by CDC and the NYSDOH, and

Whereas, The PHEP Plan and other improvements will require use of existing personal services authorized in the 2018 budget, purchase of certain equipment and payment of operating expenses, all to be 100% funded by the grant.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That Jefferson County hereby again accepts such funding covering the period of July 01, 2018 through June 30, 2019, and authorizes the Chairman of the Board of Legislators to sign any and all documents necessary to accept such funding and to execute a renewal agreement with HRI/NYSDOH, subject to approval of the County Attorney as to form and content.

Resolution No. 132

Authorizing Amended Agreement for the Provision of Language Interpreter Services in Connection with the Public Health Service

Whereas, By Resolution No. 309 of 2012, the Board of Legislators authorized a contract with Language Line for interpreter services for the period August 10, 2012 through August 8, 2016, and

Whereas, By Resolution No. 60 of 2013, the Board amended the agreement through October 24, 2017 in accordance with the New York State Office of General Services statewide contract term and rate, and

Whereas, The New York State Office of General Services has again revised the statewide contract term and rate, and

Whereas, Health care providers must be able to communicate with clients, and although infrequent, Jefferson County Public Health Service does have occasions which require the service of a language interpreter for American Sign Language and Spanish, not included in original agreement.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That Jefferson County amend an agreement with Language Line Services for the provision of American Sign Language at \$1.99 per minute and Spanish at \$1.25 per minute for the period October 25, 2017 through December 31, 2021, and be it further

Resolved, That a revised per minute rate may be paid if established charges are increased and prior written notice is provided to the Jefferson County Public Health Service, and be it further

Resolved, That the Chairman of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to execute such agreement on behalf of Jefferson County, subject to approval of the County Attorney as to form and content.

All members present voted aye.

Chairman Gray advised that as has been discussed, it is the desire of members to change the July Board meeting from Tuesday, July 3, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. to Monday, July 2, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. and entertained a motion to do so. A motion was duly made by Legislator Montigelli seconded by Legislator Drake and unanimously carried.

Chairman Gray further advised that as previously communicated, there will be a brief Special Board meeting on June 12th at 6:00 p.m. just prior to the General Services meeting and an agenda will be sent out to members later this week.

Legislator Peck reminded Board members that June is Dairy Month and in honor of that he brought a cheese platter from the Jefferson Bulk Milk/Cheese Store for everyone to enjoy. He said it was unfortunate that it took the suicide of three farmers in New York State this winter for the national media to pickup on where agriculture is headed. He said the price of milk has been on a downhill spiral since the beginning of the year and it looks like it may rebound towards the end of the year, but the real problem that is not being addressed is that there is an oversupply not just state or nationwide, but globally. He said the inactivity of Washington to do anything more than put band aids on a bad program or rename a failed program from the start and never really consider the root cause of the problem, creates a lot of uneasiness and lack of confidence among the dairy farming community. He said on the other hand it is a good year for crops so anyone on that side of the commodities market will probably do well. He encouraged everyone to enjoy dairy to the fullest extent.

Chairman Gray shared that he and Legislator Montigelli attended the recent graduation ceremony for Correction Officers and said the County can be proud of the people coming into the department. He said under the leadership of Sheriff O'Neill we have a department that is clicking on all the cylinders.

Mr. Hagemann reported that the County again had a team competing in the North Country Community Cup through the YMCA, and they came in 5th this year. The team also received the Team Spirit award and Probation Officer Dan Connor received the individual Participation award. The County has had a team participate for many years, but this is the highest they have ever placed overall.

There being no further business of the Board, on a motion by Legislator Maxon seconded by Legislator Ferris and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned at 6:40 p.m.
