TO THE HOBORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF JUNEOUS ON:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 34 of the Election Law, the Board of Elections of the County of Jefferson, herewith submits its report for the year 1934, and as a part of the same, as required by law, will be found statements showing the number of voters enrolled in each political party, the registration of voters, the vote of the Primaries and the party vote of the General Election.

The Board of Elections is organized under the provisions of Chapter 17 of the Consolidated Laws of New York State. The Board consists of two members, appointed by your Board of Supervisors, upon the recommendations of the two major political parties. The Commissioners of Elections are William M. Nott, Republican, and Bernard J. Redmond, Democrat. Their term of appointment for four years began January 1st, 1933.

The Election Law charges the Board of Elections with all details in the preparation of ballots and supplies for primaries, special and general elections and the Non-partisan Primary Election in the City of Eatertown, to the end that all vacancies in party positions and public offices may be filled. Every provision of the Election Law must be followed in order that all qualified voters may exercise their right of franchise and vote for whom they choose. The vote of the electors at Primaries, special and general elections must then be canvassed and true and accurate counts be given for each candidate, question or proposition.

In the above analysis are included the following duties of the Board of Elections:

Receiving, examining, passing upon and filing of all names of candidates, designated or nominated for public offices or party positions.

Notifying all persons who have been designated and those who have declined, and informing their committees on vacancies where there are contests that drawings for positions on the ballots would be made by the Board in the presence of those who saw fit to accept the invitation to attend.

A final preparation of ballots, statements of convess and tally sheets, stationery and supplies for each election and registration.

Supervising the hotel, rooming and boarding house reports, which have been filed by the Chief of Police of the City of Watertown.

Publishing election notices and lists of nominations.

Tabulation of party enrollments and publication thereof.

Keeping a daily record of all business and proceedings of the office.

Furnishing certificates of citizenship to persons visiting the Dominion of Genada.

Purnishing information to the various Welfare
Departments of this county and the many counties of this State.
as to the age and whether or not the applicants were citizens
of our county.

There were spirited contests in the Republican Party for the Offices of Member of Assembly and County Treasurer and in the Democratic Party for State Committeemen. Contests always magnify the vote, and the year 1934, will be recorded in the political history of Jefferson County, as the one when the greatest number of voters enjoyed their right of franchise and sought to establish party leadership and the solution of issues which had been injected in the campaigns.

The Board of Misctions had a most hectic experience preceding the Ceneral Mection. The paper ballots, of which there were 32755, could not be printed, pending a court action which decided whether or not the nominees of the Recovery Party would be printed on the ballots. Printing presses were "held-up" for nearly a week, and it was only through the most active co-operation of the printers that the necessary printing was completed

This 1952, election proved to be of greater magnitude than anticipated, consequently certain emergencies arose which prevented our accomplishing the many economies which ordinarily we have Because of the great increase in printing costs, due affected. to the Code, from which there is no redress, we believe that the bills for election printing will be substantially increased in 1935. As the printing expenses and the costs of paper are increasing by leaps and bounds, it is most apparent that the towns which fail to adopt voting machines are not exercising good financial judgment; but are allowing unnecessary expenditures which could be avoided and applied on the purchase price of a voting machine.

The 37 voting machines of the county worked perfectly. The voters have full confidence in the machines because they are aware they prevent frauds and that their interest has fully and positively been recorded. We doubt if any voting machine district could be induced to peturn to the use of paper ballots.

In conclusion, the Board of Elections, desires to thank the members of your Board for the many courtesies shown, assistance rendered and the appreciation of our work. He extend a cordial invitation to the individual members of your Board to visit our office and solicit the assistance and counsel which is within our jurisdiction.
